A note on reading the 2025-2026 program of activities

The following program represents Performing Lines' pipeline of works for the years 2025-2026. The volume of work reflects both confirmed and unconfirmed projects, in a cycle that follows an iterative, rather than annual logic and is subject to constant, evolving conversations between Performing Lines, the artists, presenters and investment partners.

Some of the variables that inform the above programming outcomes include:

- · Reliance on project-based or international funding outcomes
- Shifting creative and investment priorities of presenting partners
- Variable programming cycles festivals and presenters have different program lock-offs and confirmation deadlines.
- · Securing and aligning appropriate partners for the work
- External forces (geo-political changes, natural disasters, inflation etc) and their impact on the viability of touring.
- Creative risk Performing Lines embeds creative risk as part of its program structure and must be comfortable with some works changing course or not progressing through to presentation.

THE FARM

STUNT DOUBLE

Major Commission | National Tour (2023-2024) | International Tour (2025)

Stunt Double is a jaw-dropping immersive theatre experience bringing audiences inside the filming of a 1970s Aussie action flick. Select members of the audience are given roles to fulfill, working as extras, gaffers, clappers, art department, and more; placing them up close and personal with the actors and their extraordinary stunt doubles.

Cycling through take after take of high octane stunts; flips, jumps, fights and more; the doubles put their body on the line while the actors reap the glory. In *Stunt Double* it's the hardest working people who get paid the least and exploited the most.

The show is a tongue in cheek dive into the complex and absurd power dynamics of the film industry, into exploitation as a bloodsport, and the human costs of celebrity and our quest to come out on top.

Stunt Double is a commission of the Major Festivals Initiative and will premiere at Darwin Festival 2023 before embarking on a national tour.

LIESEL ZINK WITH LAWRENCE ENGLISH AND COLLABORATORS

US AND ALL OF THIS

Us And All Of This is a profound dance work of scale by Brisbane based choreographer Liesel Zink, set to a new score by renowned composer Lawrence English. It brings together 100 local community dancers from amateurs to professionals, for a 45 minute performance that momentarily unfolds across a large plot of urban public space.

The work premiered in March/April 2023 as a Betty Amsden Participation Project, commissioned by Arts Centre Melbourne and the Betty Amsden Endowment, and copresented with Bunjil Place and Geelong Arts Centre.

The project involves a community engagement officer and four local dance artists who assist with recruitment and teach choreography during weekend rehearsals over a five-week period. Amidst global challenges of geopolitical tension, ecological concerns, labor issues, and social isolation, Us And All Of This offers a rare moment of calm reflection, promoting togetherness and community building through stillness and shared experiences.

We will be seeking new presentation opportunities across Australia for 2024.

Co-written by Tasmanian playwright Nathan Maynard (palawa) and Aotearoa writer Jamie McCaskill (Māori), *Hide the Dog* is a truly trans-Tasman creation. This remarkable work for children tells the story of two childhood best friends Niarra (a palawa young girl) and Te Umuroa (a Māori young boy), who stumble upon the last remaining Tasmanian Tiger and resolve to keep him safe from hunters by smuggling him to Aotearoa by canoe. But hunters aren't the only ones on this tiger's tail. In order to save their furry friend they must outwit Māori gods and palawa spirits, and connect with their cultures and each other along the way.

The show is directed by celebrated theatre artist Isaac Drandic (Noongar) on a spectacular set by Māori designer Jane Hakaraia.

Hide The Dog is a commission of the Major Festivals Initiative and received its world premiere production from Performing Lines TAS at Sydney Festival 2023, subsequently touring to Perth Festival, Ten Days On The Island and RISING. LEGENDS (of the Golden Arches) is a new work from Joe Paradise Lui and Merlynn Tong unlike anything that has been seen on Australian main stages before. It sits at the intersection of Chinese/Singaporean cultural mythology, the migrant experience in Australia and the aesthetics of funerals, hell theme parks and spaces of street level experience.

Gesturing towards Gods, legends, the afterlife and hamburgers, *LEGENDS* (of the Golden Arches) sees Lui and Tong attempt to marry up the poetry, mythology and wisdom of their heritage with a contemporary understanding of the society and culture in which they both live.

The production received Creative Development support via the Major Festivals Initiative with the backing of Perth Festival, Brisbane Festival and Sydney Festival. *LEGENDS* (of the Golden Arches) will continue its development during 2023 and 2024, before premiere seasons in 2025.

FLAMES DANCED IN THEIR HAIR BUT DID NOT BURN THEM

World Premiere (2025) | Market Development (2024) | National Tour (2025)

Flames Danced In Their Hair But Did Not Burn Them is a multi-screen video installation about wildness, transgression and body politics, created by filmmaker Kate Blackmore, theatre makers Adena Jacobs and Aaron Orzech, composer Kelly Ryall, and the young performers who co-created Fraught Outfit's controversial production of The Bacchae.

The work totals approximately 30 minutes in length on a loop, inviting audiences in every 45 mins. The material will combine behind the scenes archival footage from the 2016 production with interviews and video content created in 2022. The installation will evoke an experience of extreme intimacy between the audience and performers, whilst situating the content in an environment that is consciously 'theatrical' which, like the 2015 production, calls attention to the act of spectatorship, and takes us into unexpected terrain, beyond the threshold.

The work is a co-commission of Substation and Melbourne Fringe and will premiere in October 2023. We will be seeking further national presentations in 2024.

What does Rumpelstiltskin (Rumpel) get up to when he isn't spinning gold in exchange for children? Yoga? Shopping? Why does Rumpel even want a child? Rumpel is a quirky, ordinary single father-to-be, consumed by his obsession with gaining a child, and his love and desire for a family. A relatable, loveable story, that slowly unveils its connections to the beloved fairytale as the story takes a dark turn, and we are left to wrestle with our sympathy for the main character. A story with comic appeal while exploring themes of loneliness, masculinity, shame and pride.

A solo, one act opera, the first of its kind in Australia to be created for the countertenor. The countertenor voice is the only voice type that uses two distinct voices – the upper falsetto voice, and the lower baritone voice. This duality of sound is a unique facet of the voice that can represent insanity, 'masculine' and 'feminine' sounds, or split consciousness. Utilising a Nord synthesizer to explore unique sound pairings between this versatile instrument and the countertenor voice, we will be working with an Australian composer to write music that uses the strengths of this instrument and the varied sound qualities it can create.

Sphinx is a planned largescale cinematic zoetropelike performance installation investigating the female gaze, and an homage to little known feminist films and filmmakers. In 1977 Laura Mulvey made *Riddles* of *the Sphinx*, a film investigating her own work on the male gaze, setting out to explore and create a feminist language for cinema outside of traditional narrative norms. The film has very little narrative and concentrates on the gender politics of domestic life. It uses 360-degree pans which move slowly and without any pleasurable focus on the women characters.


In a creative development in 2024, THE RABBLE will use the significant archive at ACMI and the National Film and Sound Archive to further research experimental feminist film makers, ultimately conducting a series of experiments using camera techniques pioneered by the above-mentioned film makers. This is partially with a view to determining how these techniques might influence a feminist dramaturgy for the camera in live performance.

Mrityu is a new cross-artform performance work by Carnatic musician and performer Arjunan Puveendran exploring the processing of death through rituals, drawing largely from South Asian rituals and arts heritages, re-contextualised for an Australian audience.

It is a performance of shared narratives using a distinctive merging of monologues, music, ritual, and movement from the perspective of an observer – not mourner, dying or deceased. The work responds to the post-pandemic environment exploring how we have become desensitised to death, juxtaposed against the pain of not being able to grieve, mourn or perform rituals in customary ways.

The work was seeded through the Rescue-Restart fund offered by Create NSW and will receive a further creative development in 2023.

IT'S ALREADY HAPPENED, WE'RE JUST IN THE PAST

Creative Development (2024) | World Premiere (2025)

This new work presents a slow-motion, looping, accumulating, durational experimental fight-dance using body-assist apparatus and analogue film effects scripted onto the gallery walls to illustrate a suspended unstable moment of crisis.

Film-craft allows us to examine disaster in close detail over time, and from physical safety. To watch, pause, and watch again, to appreciate the beauty of the spectacle, or the narrative of the occurrence, capturing what usually takes a shocking thunderous moment where adrenaline can hijack thought. This project seeks to expand the edges of the thunderous moment in a live performance, and dwell on the act of watching. Shifting to a geological or cosmic time scale, our thunderous moment is a suspended, prolonged jolt.

Using body-assist effects borrowed from filmcraft, the artists' achieve improbable movement, creating a space where time and physics are queer: it repeats, accumulates, loops. The fightdance uses the spectacle of destruction of the gallery to examine the destabilising experience of witnessing and living-within multiple crises.

Presented as a raucous interactive live gameshow: two teams compete for the crown of Ultimate Queen Mumma in a series of bizarre, boisterous, and hilarious tasks torn from the very real experiences of motherhood throughout its stages, while the verbatim performances offset this riotous battle with poignancy, relief, and chaos.

Created by a collective of Tasmanian women artists, *MENTAL – The Motherload* is in the midst of a regional tour of the island, and a further national tour is in development for 2024.

NSW PRODUCERS PLATFORM

Sector Development (2024)

Performing Lines NSW has brought its innovative skills development program for up-and-coming Producers to NSW, for a series of sessions designed to answer questions and provide real-world content to develop emerging producers' skills and experience.

The NSW Producers' Platform provides an opportunity for 8 independent producers to undertake a rigorous skills development program spanning 10-weeks. Facilitated by Performing Lines, alongside specialist guest speakers, this industry-led program incorporates practical, handson learning around processes and procedures for producing works to the highest professional standard and is informed by Performing Lines' methodology of learn-by-practice through the sharing of case studies and templates. In 2024 a small group of the Producer Platform participants will be selected to undertake a paid placement at a partner organisation.

The NSW Producers Platform is specifically catered to NSW-based producers – both metropolitan and regional – with a view to create a resilient, flexible, and strong cohort of independent producers working within our state.

LOCAL GIANTS

Sector Development (2024-2025)

Local Giants is an ambitious capacity building program which seeks to unlock the cultural ambition and potential of regional Australia; born of a three way partnership between Performing Arts Connections (PAC) Australia, Performing Lines and Regional Arts Australia.

Following extensive consultation and with support from the Restart Investment to Sustain and Expand (RISE) Fund—an Australian Government initiative, the Australian Government through the Regional Arts Fund, and the NSW Government through Create NSW, Local Giants is a program running across 2021 – 2025 in partnership with regional partner venues in South Australia, New South Wales and Queensland.

The program consists of several intersecting parts including a Regional Producers Platform, Regional Artist Residencies in three states, and new Regional Work Co-Commissions.

In its first phase Local Giants has provided opportunities for over 75 artists, arts workers and producers, across the three residencies and producer platform, resulting in the development of up to three new regional works. NATIONAL

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TARRALEAH RESIDENCY

Sector Development (2024-2026)

The Tarraleah Artist Residency is a core part of the annual program of Performing Lines TAS, creating a space for roughly 20 artists per year to share ideas and develop their professional practice.

Artists come together and explore new project ideas that often go on to reach the national stage. A range of highly skilled mentors from different arts practices across Australia are invited to inform each project's development.

In an intensive three-day event, the residency provides an exquisite regional setting, a supportive creative environment to test ideas and push projects to their next level of artistic discovery. Tarraleah Residency affords a highly efficient and inclusive platform for the generation of new works, new networks for artists, and additional resources for the sector. Each residency also has at least one First Nations mentor and four First Nations participants.

Local and national Festival Directors are also invited as observers, so they can connect with projects early and where aligned, begin conversations with artists about their work.



TASMANIA SECTOR DAY

Sector Development (2024-2026)

An annual Sector Day held by Performing Lines TAS to foster community, knowledge sharing and connection at all levels of the Tasmanian arts industry.

Representatives from both the State and Federal arts funding bodies attend, as do the Artistic Directors of all the funded performing arts companies, CEOs of presenting organisations, Festival Directors and key independent artists. The focus of the event is flexible so that it can include break-out discussions with interest groups, introductions of new artists and company visions and challenging issues for the sector.



FIRST NATIONS MENTORING

Sector Development (2024-2026)

Performing Lines TAS maintains an annual mentorship for First Nations artists of any discipline within the performing art. The mentorship program has played an unparalleled role in the career development of First Nation artists in lutruwita/ Tasmania. Across a range of roles, each artist has a personalised program that is tailored to their skills, takes them in new and exciting directions and connects them to career opportunities.

The 2024 mentee will be announced towards the end of 2023.



Sector Development (2024)

In 2024, Performing Lines TAS partners with WaPA to expand the MuylatinaProducers Program. This collaboration allows Walantanalinany Palingina (WaPa), an Aboriginal-led arts organization, to enhance capacity building for artists and arts workers through a culturally safe and customized model of intergenerational knowledge sharing. Producer Sinsa Mansell's extensive learning journey over five years of sector engagement forms the foundation for Muylathina's culturally specific developmental approach.

The six-month producing program takes place in 2023, followed by a placement opportunity in PL Tas' Producer Platform alongside the Tarraleah Artist residency in 2024-25. Looking ahead to 2026-27, the goal is to employ a new First Nations trainee Producer, fostering strategic capacity building and support for artists and arts workers. This initiative aims to create sustained growth, development, and care for First Nations arts workers in the future.

MAKE SOME SPACE

Sector Development (2024-2026)

Make Some Space is a professional development program for 15-25 years olds in Victoria to foster the next generation of diverse arts leaders by developing pathways into the arts who may not otherwise have access to them and paying the artists to be involved. The 10 local participants are paid to take part in a two month program of training in producing and practice, leading up to a subversive and collaboratively created variety show in which they also perform. Selection prioritises marginalized and under-represented young people. The program is run by Sarah Austin and Performing Lines VIC in partnership with the presentation venue, The Bowery Theatre / Brimbank City Council.

KOLYANG PROGRAM

Sector Development (2024-2026)

The Kolyang Creative Hub and Kolyang Artist Lab, initiated by Performing Lines WA (PLWA), have been integral to the independent performing arts sector in Western Australia. These programs ran successfully in 2020, 2021, and 2022, evolving and adapting over time based on feedback and sector needs.

The Kolyang Creative Hub offers a three-week responsive program for mid-career and established independent artists. It fosters interdisciplinary artistic practice sharing, creative developments, panels, and conversations. This hub serves as a platform for breaking down silos, promoting knowledge sharing, critical thinking, and innovative approaches to working.

Running concurrently with or in close proximity to the Creative Hub, the Kolyang Artist Lab provides a creative space for emerging and early-career artists with diverse lived experiences. It allows them to explore ideas, forge relationships, and delve into performance-making processes.

Both initiatives follow a similar methodology

- An open expression of interest, inviting artists and producers to apply.
- An Artist Advisory Group to help select and support participants and shape the program.
- No fixed outcomes were expected participation and learning were central.
- Participants were paid.
- Artist-led, with each year having a focus on one aspect of cultural diversity, equity and inclusion.

The Department of Local Government, Sports and Cultural Industries (DLGSCI), through the Arts Organisation Investment Program, confirmed ongoing support for the new-look Kolyang Program of Industry Development Initiatives from 2024-27, further affirming its importance and potential for ongoing positive impact.
